No-All grade levels met 90% or better on the TAAS standard according to the *Phase-In Summary Report* for all students but some subgroups did not meet the standard.

No-Our overall attendance rate was 95.4%. (AEIS '02-'03)

Yes-Our overall dropout rate was 0.0%.

No data-No comparison data is available since the first TAKS test administration was Spring '03. But, teachers and administrators have continued to attend staff development to improve TAKS performance and TEKS mastery.

Yes-The campus has continued to integrate technology into the curriculum. Some examples are: Accelerated Math implemented at the campus; teachers continuing to increase use of computers for work processing, research, drawing, etc. at the campus; continued staff development in technology; etc.

Yes- Also, Accelerated Math, SuccessMaker, and other programs were added at the campus to help accelerate students as well as accommodate different learning styles.

Yes-The campus is working through their campus plans to help all teachers become highly qualified through staff development and other means. The district has also developed and is implementing an evaluation that meets the highly qualified requirements of paraprofessionals.

Aligned and coordinated curriculum and developed curriculum documents including benchmarks, timelines, etc.

Yes-The campus has developed preliminary benchmarks for each grade level. Each teacher is in the process of developing six-week curriculum overview documents for each subject as a subject-grade level team. The teachers have met in vertical and horizontal teams and will continue to do so as the curriculum is written.

Improved school climate

Provided programs to promote safe and drug-free schools

Yes-A human sexuality instructional program, "Worth the Wait", has been recommended by the School Health Advisory Council, approved by the Board of Trustees, and purchased to be implemented 2004-05. Also, an anti-bullying program has begun with teacher staff development taking place at all campuses and surveys being developed for grades 3-12. The anti-bullying program "Don't Laugh at Me" is also being implemented in grades 3-8 next year and will be supplemented with other materials.

Enhanced system of effective communication to parents and community

Yes-A Gifted and Talented parent meeting was held to explain to parents the updated Tulia G/T Plan. Also, Title I parents meetings were held at different times to provide flexibility for parents to attend. Also, school representatives have continued to speak to community and business groups on such topics as school finance, NCLB, human sexuality instructional programs and anti-bullying programs being implemented at the schools, etc.

Promoted good character in students

Yes-The counselor at the campus have continued with class, group, and individual guidance activities utilizing such programs as "Steps to Respect", "Character Counts", "Cool Kids", etc.

Increased parent and community involvement

Encouraged effective and quality parental involvement through a written parent involvement plan

Yes-The campus developed a Parental Involvement Plan and distributed the plans to parents at each campus.

Increased school and community cooperation and pride

Yes-The school continues to work with the Swisher County Community Grant Program in order to coordinate activities that will provide educational assistance to the community, such as with the installation of the school's NovaNET program for the GED program at the downtown computer lab. Also, teachers encourage student participation in community activities, such as through Veterans Day Program at the junior high, etc. In addition, school representatives have continued to speak to community and business groups on

such topics as school finance, NCLB, human sexuality instructional programs and anti-bullying programs being implemented at the schools, etc. in order for the community to become more aware of the programs being offered at the school.

Increased community involvement through participation in the Community Network Grant

Yes-The school continues to work with the Swisher County Community Grant Program in order to coordinate activities that will provide educational assistance to the community, such as with the installation of the school's NovaNET program for the GED program at the downtown computer lab.

Were the goals met for 2003-2004?

Was the student academic performance enhanced? Evidenced by what?

No Comments: Even though, except for one grade level, at least 90% of our students (sum of grades 3-11) met the TAAS passing standard goal in Spring 2003, the goals were not completely met as evidenced by our TAKS scores for the Spring of 2003 (AEIS 2002-03). We were above the state performance for met standard for the sum of all tests taken in ELA 74% (State-71.5%) but below in all other areas – Reading 85% (85.6%), Mathematics 76.8% (77.8%), Writing 84.8% (86.3%), Science 62.7% (70.7%), Social Studies (89.1%), and for All Tests 64.3% (67.4%).

But at the campus, new programs are continuing to be implemented to help the at-risk child achieve success; and staff development is being provided for teachers to help them increase their students' successes.

Were curriculum and instruction improved? Evidenced by what?

Yes Comments: Curriculum and instruction are being improved through the development of curriculum documents for each subject and grade level in the District. The benchmarks for each grade level have been established as well as the forms being used by each teacher to develop their six-week overviews. The curriculum process is continuing with the teachers submitting six-week overview documents each six weeks and by documenting the TEKS taught through their annual TEKS checklist. Hopefully, each grade level will have an increase in TAKS scores in Spring 2004, even though the standards at all grade levels except for exit are increasing. Plans are already being made for staff development next year to include completing and refining the curriculum documents that are being written this year.

Also, teachers are continuing to attend staff development opportunities at our educational service center as well as through conferences, etc.

Was the school climate improved? Evidenced by what?

Yes Comments: The campus is continuing to work on school climate. It has developed an awareness of the violence of bullying in our schools through staff development at the campus. This emphasis on bullying awareness will continue through student surveys to be given Spring 2004 and the implementation of the "Don't Laugh at Me" program next year in grades 3-8. Also, the "Worth the Wait" human sexuality instructional program is being implemented in 2004-05 for grades 6-8.

Was parental and community involvement increased? Evidenced by what?

Yes Comments: The school implemented its objective of increasing parent and community involvement with the distribution of the Parental Involvement Plan for the District as well as for the campus to every parent. Also, a District-wide G/T parent meeting was held to update parents on the current G/T plan. In addition, the partnership between the school and the Swisher County Community Grant Program has grown through the installation of NovaNET at the downtown lab location for use in its GED program. Furthermore, the School Health Advisory Council (SHAC) has become more involved in school programs, such as with the recommendation of the "Worth the Wait" program. Also, the SHAC is trying to reach out to the community through informing ministers through the ministerial alliance about the challenges facing the District as well as programs that the District is implementing to help face the challenges of our youth.
